- Created and assisted with facilitation of Small Business Relief grants for non-profit and City











Crime Rate Continues to Decline

Incidents

- The average number of incidents are down in Goldsboro, while the number of structure fires are up.
 - Structure Fires (Jan. Oct. 2020) 37 total
 - Total incidents (Jan. Oct. 2020) 1,850 total

Improved ISO Rating

As of 8-1-20, Goldsboro boasts a Class 2 ISO rating.

Community Outreach

Each station has a community engagement project.

Community Partnerships and Fundraising

- LOWES supports GFD's public education program and charity to local soup kitchens
- Department has raised nearly \$20,000 for 1919 refurbishment.

Safety

- Received four safety awards from OSHA-DOL
- Navigated the COVID-19 pandemic with no lapses in service and minimal instances of positivity







Parks and Recreation

- Continuing to provide programming to our community during this pandemic.
 - Youth sports camps
 - Virtual Learning Camps at W.A. Foster, T.C. Coley and Herman Park Center
- Completed the HV Brown Restroom Shelter and the Pedestrian Bridge for Reedy Branch Greenway







Travel & Tourism


- Visitors spent more than \$190 million in Goldsboro-Wayne Co in 2019 (6.7% increase from 2018, a record-breaking year!)
- Goldsboro-Wayne County is ranked 32nd out of 100 counties in NC for generating the most tourism dollars
- Bryan Multi-Sports Complex generated over \$4 million of economic impact in 2019 for its first full operating year
- Wilber's BBQ Reopening an iconic landmark for BBQ enthusiasts around the country
- Visit Goldsboro has been awarded over \$100,000 of federal funding through CARES Act programs to help promote travel back to the area


Street Resurfacing/Improvement Projects

Resurfacing Projects

- Proposed list is estimated at \$1.8 million, \$1.5 million is budgeted.
- Two previous years have come in under budget
- Expected to go out for bids in January

Improvement Projects

- This paving project includes:
 - Oak Hill Drive from North Berkeley Boulevard to Green Drive;
 - East Chestnut Street from South Slocumb Street to South Leslie Street;
 - Hawthorne Street from Oleander Avenue to Andrews Avenue;
 - Mimosa Street from Claiborne Street to Randolph Street;
- This project is 45% complete with a contract completion date of February 27, 2021.





Business/Industry Growth

While COVID-19 is still a major concern, building has taken the driver's seat in our local economy.

- The City Inspection Department issued permits for approximately \$90.8M of commercial, residential and miscellaneous building improvements.
- Projects include:
 - Microbrewery
 - Stay APT Suites
 - Renu-Life Traumatic Injury Center
 - WCC Automobile Collision Center
 - Strickland Insurance renovation and expansion
 - Deacon Jones Auto Repair(Old Ford Dealership)
 - Old Wachovia building (Apartment Renovation)
- We currently have 1,810 registered businesses within the City.



COVID-19 Response

- City leaders proactively prepared for and addressed the pandemic situation.
 - Provided masks and other PPE for employees
 - Increased cleaning in high-traffic, high-touch areas
 - Installed hand sanitizer units throughout facilities
 - Implemented telework procedures
 - Assisted in the recovery effort by providing CARES funding to non-profits (\$200K) and small business owners (\$100K)
- The City will use \$150,000 of CARES money to install new fiber optic cables on all water towers to expand Broadband services throughout the city.
