## 17.5% Water and Sewer Rate Increase Approved in City's FY20-21 Budget


The increase will fund much-needed infrastructure improvements.

The Goldsboro City Council authorized a 17.5% water and sewer rate increase in the FY20-21 budget approved June 17. The 17.5% water and sewer rate increase is necessary to continue to provide safe, high quality drinking water and reliable sewer services to our customers. With the increase, a customer who uses 5,000 gallons of water inside the city would pay \$31.11 for water and the sewer bill would be \$36.55, for a total of \$67.66.

The last water and sewer rate increase was \$0.05 per 1,000 gallons in July 1, 2016, and prior to that it was 2011 for our customers. An increase is needed now to make necessary improvements to our aging infrastructure. Parts of the City's water and sewer systems date back to 1888 as one of North Carolina's first 12 community water systems. There is currently \$22.3 million in debt service from several projects, including phase I and II water treatment plant optimization, sewer bonds, sewer repairs, and the advanced metering infrastructure.

Projects over the next 10 years are estimated to cost over \$200 million as we look to rebuild our water treatment plant from the 1950s and meet new drinking water quality standards with new technologies. We also need to optimize treatment and replace equipment that is past its working life expectancy at the water reclamation facility and over 500 miles of collection and distribution pumping and piping systems.

With the 17.5% increase, we look to reinvest in our system, provide resilient service like we did during Hurricanes Matthew and Florence, and COVID-19, and rebuild our fund balance that has depleted with emergency and reactive maintenance.

### City's Yard and Bulk Waste Service Guidelines

Public Works

Follow these guidelines for disposing of yard waste and bulky items.

#### Leaves:

- Rake leaves into a pile within 6 feet of the street.
- Do NOT place leaves in the street, ditch or curb and gutters they will clog our stormwater collection system and cause flooding.
- Do NOT place leaves over meter boxes, manhole covers or water valves.
- Do NOT mix leaves with garbage or they will not be picked up.

#### Limbs:

- Limbs must be no larger than 12 inches in diameter and 6 feet long.
- Piles must be no more than 3 x 3 yards or approximately 3 feet wide x 3 feet high x 10 feet long.
- Larger limbs and stumps must be taken to the landfill by the resident.
- Contractors are responsible for the disposal of ALL debris they generate.

NOTE: All leaf and limb piles must be separated or they will NOT be picked up.

#### **Bulk Waste:**

- Bulk pick up service is provided every Wednesday to all residential customers with an active water account, unless there is a holiday during the week.
- Items such as household furnishings, appliances, mattresses, box springs, lawn equipment and similar items too large or bulky to be placed in the garbage

rollout cart and not eligible for recycling or yard waste collection are considered bulk waste and must be scheduled for collection.

- Residents must call before Tuesday at noon to schedule a Wednesday pickup.
- Service is limited to six items per pickup, and all items must be free of food, clothing, trash and flammable materials such as gasoline.
- All building materials, construction debris, car parts, hazardous items, etc. are prohibited.
- Place bulk waste within 6 feet of the curb and at least 3 feet away from other collection items and obstacles such as mailboxes, phone poles, vehicles, etc. Do not place bulk waste in the rollout carts. Do not block the sidewalk.
- All scheduled items must be at the curb the night before the pickup.



Goldsboro's Public Utilities Department has a reminder for you: your toilet is not a trash can. Items such as wipes (even those labeled as flushable), napkins, gloves and cloth rags can all contribute to sanitary sewer backups and overflows, and cause damage to our pumps. Flushing these items is a violation of our Sewer Use Ordinance.

Only toilet paper and human waste should be flushed. All other items should be thrown in the trash.


