Downtown Ghost Tour Dates: 10/16 & 10/30 (Downtown tours start and finish at Well-Traveled Beer)

Battlefield Dates: 10/9 & 10/23 (Tours start and finish at the Goldsboro Bridge Battlefield Site)

Goldsboro IT Department Wins Award for Website Chatbot Feature

An innovative chatbot application earned the City of Goldsboro's Information Technology department a Center for Digital Government Project Experience Award. Goldsboro was one of 30 municipalities recognized during the fourth annual Government Experience Awards. The awards recognize the achievements and best practices of states, cities and counties that are radically improving the experience of government and pushing the boundaries of how citizen services are delivered.

"Our state and local government winners this year demonstrated that focusing on the government experience provides a foundation that played a vital role in responding and adapting to the uncertainties and disruptions of 2020," said Dustin Haisler, Chief Innovation Officer for the Center for Digital Government. "This year's winners employed innovative methods and technologies to transform their government experiences, including leveraging citizen-centric platforms such as Mississippi's myMS; employing AI to perform sentiment analysis on chatbots; and infusing

digital services enterprise-wide for both internal and citizen-facing services."

The chatbot, which was created in-house, uses artificial intelligence to improve engagement with residents. Users can access the feature on the City's website or text their questions to 919-580-4299. The chatbot knows the answer to more than 32,000 questions. It can help residents find job openings, councilmember information, and trash and recycling schedules. Residents can also use the chatbot to report potholes, issues with traffic signals and more.

REMINDER from the Inspections Department

All business registration renewals were due July 1, 2020. If you have not renewed your business registration for 2020, please contact the Inspections Department at 919-580-4385 or drop by to see us at the City Hall Annex, 200 N. Center Street.

If your company has relocated, or if you are opening a new business, you will need a business registration. The annual business registration is beneficial to assist in the management of the City's zoning and public safety responsibilities.

The Inspections Department is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday to assist business owners/contractors with their inspections and permitting needs.

We have made a few changes to accommodate COVID-19 requirements, and we are committed to making sure customer service remains a priority.

Yard and Bulk Waste Service Reminders

Leaves:

- Make sure to rake leaves into a pile at the curb no later than the night before the scheduled recycle day.
- Due to heavier volumes during leaf season, there may be possible delays to the normal schedules.

Bulk Waste:

- Bulk waste pick up service is provided to residential customers with active water accounts and is a FREE service.
- Bulk waste pick up is limited to no more than six items per pick up address.
- Residents must call ahead to schedule a pick up prior to the pickup day.
- Bulk waste pick up is provided weekly on Wednesdays unless it is a holiday week. Bulk waste will not be collected during the week of a holiday.




Representatives from Cooper's Tavern recently presented a check for \$4,725 to the Goldsboro Fire Department to help fund the restoration of the 1919 LaFrance fire engine. Cooper's Tavern hosted a golf tournament Sept. 26 to raise money for the LaFrance restoration. The engine is the oldest existing piece of the City's motorized firefighting equipment. The engine, which is currently stored at Goldsboro Fire Station Number 5, will cost around \$70,000 to refurbish. Potential future uses include public display, parade participation and carrying the caskets of fallen firefighters. Recycling Guidelines

Keep unacceptable items out of the recycling bin.

ACCEPTED



Plastics 1 & 2: Cleaning bottles and containers (put pumps in the trash); food and beverage tubs, jugs and bottles (keep lids and caps screwed on); bathroom bottles (put pumps in the trash)



Paper: Mixed paper, office paper, glossy paper, envelopes, Post-it notes, newspapers, magazines, phone books and catalogs, paper towel rolls, paper bags, flattened food boxes, paperboard and cardboard (free of food stains only)



Aluminum, tin, steel cans (quick rinse)



Please do not bag your recyclables.

NOT ACCEPTED

- Aluminum foil or trays
- Aseptic containers
- Broken glass
- Clothing or fabric**
- Dishes or cookware
- Electronics**
- Food waste**
- Glass**
- Hardcover books
- Hazardous waste**
- Household trash
- Light bulbs
- Liquid waste (paint, cleaners, etc.)
- Medical waste
- Motor oil/pesticide containers

- Paper plates and paper towels
- Plastic bags and wrap*
- Scrap metal or wires**
- Shredded paper or Styrofoam
- Tanglers (cords, hoses, wires, etc.)
- Wax boxes
- Window or mirror glass
- Yard waste

* Take clean and dry plastic bags and film back to the grocery store to recycle separately and/or take to a public or private drop-off recycling facility.

** These materials can be taken to a public or private drop-off recycling center to be recycled separately.
